2. Overall administrative efficiency (22 items)

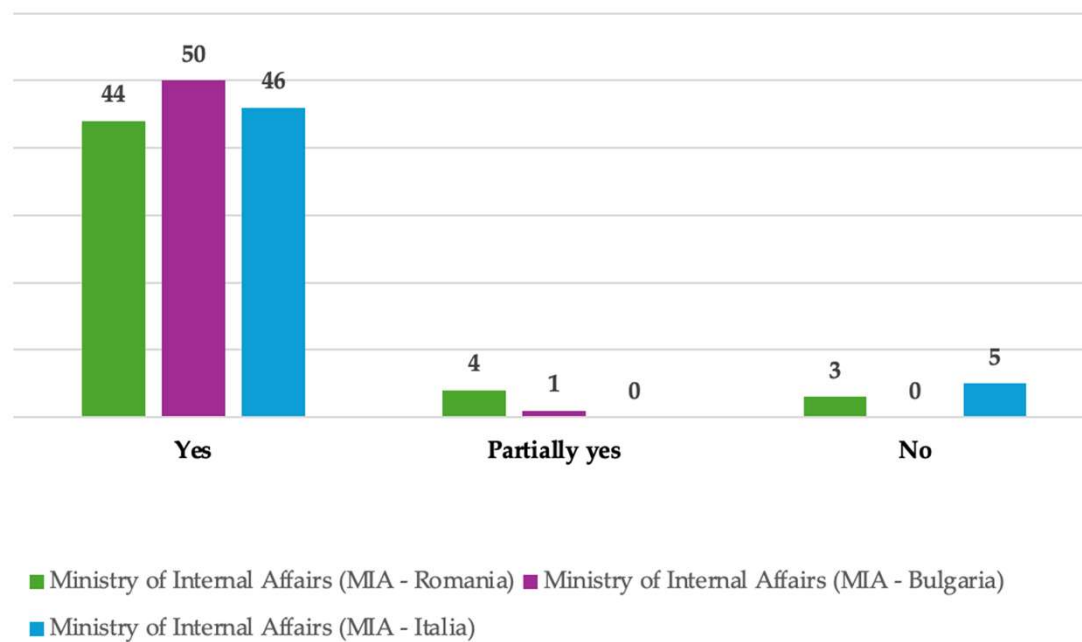

CROSS-COUNTRY PUBLICATION MODELS

BG Bulgaria's Ministry of Interior

- Systematic document availability
- Strong traceability
- Minimal partiality

RO Romania's Ministry of Internal Affairs

- Rich documentary production
- Irregular updating
- Complex website navigation

IT Italy's Ministry of Interior

- Strong formal transparency architecture
- Stable planning documentation
- Gaps in outcome-based reporting

KEY STRENGTHS AND WEAKNESSES BY COUNTRY: ROMANIA'S MINISTRY OF INTERNAL AFFAIRS

Strengths

- Dedicated anti-corruption section
- Integrity plans and reports
- Broad transparency content

Limitations

- Irregular updating
- Weak maintenance of the open data section

KEY STRENGTHS AND WEAKNESSES BY COUNTRY: BULGARIA'S MINISTRY OF INTERIOR

Strengths

- Most comprehensive coverage
- Strong documentary availability
- Clear procurement transparency
- Full administrative efficiency coverage

Limitation

- The anti-corruption section lacks clear update indicators

KEY STRENGTHS AND WEAKNESSES BY COUNTRY: ITALY'S MINISTRY OF INTERIOR

Strengths

- Structured transparency portal
- Strong planning documentation (PIAO)
- Clear procurement disclosure

Limitations

- No clearly identifiable code of ethics
- Right-of-access reporting is not available
- No structured consultation hub
- No outcome-based accountability reporting

COMPARATIVE INSIGHT

A comparative reading of the three cases suggests that differences relate not only to what is published, but also to how disclosure is structured and maintained over time.

- Bulgaria's Ministry of Interiors most closely resembles a documentary repository, prioritising the systematic availability of formal materials and enabling verification.
- Romania's Ministry of Internal Affairs provides extensive publication, but with uneven curation, which complicates navigation and reduces visibility of continuity, updating, and results reporting.
- Italy's Ministry of Interiors relies heavily on structured portals and formal transparency channels, supporting disclosure of planned activities and organisational documentation, but appearing less effective in publishing outcome-focused indicators.
